farmlet out the back of Dannevirke.

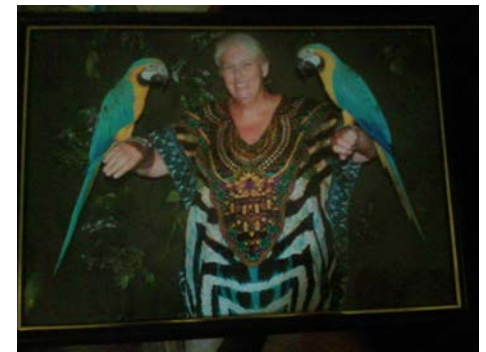
Hooray for Hudson's!

A couple of hours before Hudson's Circus opened in Northam, WA, a storm arrived, thunder, rain, the lot. This was still going when the show began, and the rain continued until after intermission. But it was dry inside. The crowd just kept coming, and they had to keep bringing in extra seats to cope with the numbers which was great. I have never seen such a crowd for a circus here for years.

Goldie opened the show with his humour followed by the hoop lady. Never before have I seen hula done with fire on the hoop! It was magical. Belinda then brought in the ponies in alternating colours, brown, white, brown, white, brown. Beautiful animals.

Goldie then taught about clown cars. Most people do not realise a car can talk and wants to go driving, even with stinky pants driving it. Was an uproar when the car told Goldie it was clown car wee-wee not water he was hit with! Got a victim from the audience to help with the car when it did not want to go. A good match as he was a real clown himself! The silks, macaw and contortion by Lara with the upside down archery rounded out the first half.

The rain was still pouring down, but Shane kindly organised a discount for me to get a picture with the macaws (right). It was only afterwards that I realised that I was wearing a top that perfectly matched their colours!



Second half was opened by Goldie with his humour again. Then came the hula hoops, camels, water buffalo, llamas, camels and trapeze with Goldie in between.

I managed to teach some people sitting near me that you can easily tell that they were llamas and not alpacas by looking at the ears because llamas have banana shaped ears. Of course the kids picked up on it and were going around saying about the "llama banana ears". There was just so much good about the circus and no bad. It is hard this pick the best parts of the show.

What I will remember is that it is the first time I have ever seen real live macaws and water buffalo. Being able to actually have the macaws on

my arms was a highlight. They are very gentle, yet I could feel the strength in their feet. The most surprising thing was how lightweight they are. I have held heavier galahs! But they are so beautiful and well looked after. The animals are all very obviously loved.

The talk around town was that everyone loved the show, and some were heard to be disappointed that they missed out after hearing of the great show. I enjoyed it as much as the circuses I saw as a child in the 1970s where they still had animals like elephants, monkeys and big cats.

This is definitely a circus that is worth revisiting. Everyone was so nice.

Ray was well known for his hit records *Ahab the Arab*, *Guitarzan*, *Everything is Beautiful*. He was very interested in animals and asked me a lot of questions about my work.

All had lunch at a restaurant opposite the St Kilda Palais.

26: Wayne, Terry and I fixed bear fence where they had been pulling at it. Raymond Dellar visited me at the park; showed him around. Raymond came in while I put cats away. Wayne came to our place for dinner tonight.

30: Greg not in this morning so I was in ticket office. Worked two circuses. Fed bears and put them away. Greg tripped on office step and cut his head, went home.

June 1: Fed bears carrots and bread. Cats were shot at last night in their dens. Vet came out and checked Molly's right front paw, just a graze. All the other cats OK. Police came out. Phill

and I broke up fight in bear compound.

5: Took ute to Melton and got greens, fed hoofed stock. Helped on camel ride. Lion Park admission was 50c and \$1.50, has now gone up to \$1 and \$2.

9: Got petrol at work. Also filled the park vehicles. Two cats got from section 4 into section 3, they started a brawl. Greg and I broke up fight while Phill and Wayne put section 3 cats into den (with great difficulty). Took about half an hour to get them

down the den end of the compound and away from the gate. Had trouble getting the section 4 cats into their den tonight, no trouble with section 3 cats.

12: Cleaned picnic area. Three donkeys got out and into the parking lot. They split up so we had to get them one at a time. I worked two circuses. Car hit a fence pole in section 1, it was stuck on it. Had to tow it off, bumper has a dent. On gate 4 for feeding.

14: Let out cats. Wayne and I boned cat sections. I went to Tuckerbag and got greens for hoofed stock. Did the camel ride while Phill had lunch. Put cats away. Bears did not want to go in dens. Took us 35 minutes to get them in.

Ashley's amazing feat

Life-long wire walker and burns survivor Ashley Brophy smashed through a seven-year-old world record while taking part in the Australian Circus Festival at Stardust Circus in Blacktown on November 16.

At 6am he began his attempt to break two world records: his own 32-year-old record of 11.566km in 3.5 hours and 15.68km within 24 hours. He also wanted to set a record for the greatest distance in 12 hours.

Brophy walked the 15.68km in eight hours and 26 minutes. He set a record of 20.02km in 12 hours, which he hopes will stand for many years.

"I had a good feeling that I would be able to break the (24-hour) record," Brophy said. "I tried to break my own record but in a way I'm glad I didn't, because that's still a longstanding record of 32 years."

The wire is 6.8m high and 17.5m long and it took 897 crossings to break the record. By 2.26pm he had smashed the distance.

"I feel great that I was able to get it done early or earlish," Mr Brophy said.

The previous record was set by Joey Kelly in 2010. But for Mr Brophy the walk was not just about a record, it was about proving to his kids "they can achieve whatever they want in life". "I had a fire accident 18 months ago," he said. "I had young kids and I wanted to show them that it's not the end of the world, that you still get past a lot."

Last year a generator

caught fire on the circus grounds and while he was trying to put the fire out, a jerry can exploded in his face.

He received second- and third-degree burns to his face, hands and legs. "I was ... lucky with 16 per cent burns on my body, both superficial and full thickness, with no lost body parts or facial scars," he said of the July incident which kept him off the high wire until October last year.

Brophy's achievements will be submitted to Record Holders Republic for official recognition.

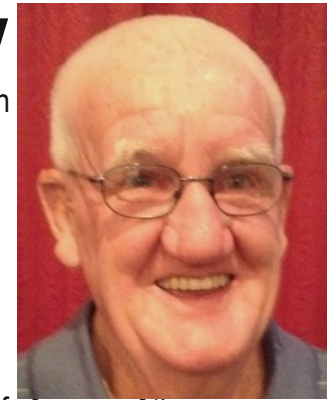

The programme lasts for around 60 minutes and features no intermission.

Trevor presents a fast moving show, act after act and the audience goes away very well entertained.

Getting Extreme with Circus Phoenix

I know they have this on their agenda, but the sooner the better. On the inside the setup is great. Good seating, lighting, music, Ring announcing by Mali De Goey is great and he manages to keep the people involved right throughout the show. The show kicks off with a parade of the performers and gets straight into the action with some flair riding by Ruben Chadwick. Precision at its best by this young man before getting

into the more traditional acts. The hoops with Chantel, I love this light-hearted act, it just seems to make everyone smile and gets them in the mood for things to come. Chelle Hafner on the swinging pole; Kate and Amelia Smith, on double trapeze; Chantel on Russian silks all take care of business in the air and all perform beautifully. Cassandra Gasser has some interludes of illusion assisted by Kate and Amelia that leave the audience scratching their heads in wonder. Comedy is taken care of by Jon Paul and Jefferson. These two are masters of comedy and always get great crowd reaction. Phoenix Harrison thrills the crowd with his Wheel of Steel, gets the crowd jumping and hanging on. Closing the show is the ever popular Globe of Death with Jefferson and Phoenix. These two put on a great performance with the highlight being the



beautiful Cassandra Gasser standing in the globe while the boys ride around at high speed with only inches to spare. This leaves the audience gasping and squirming in their seats. After the show the cast all assemble at the entrance for photos and meet and greet with the audience. There always seems to be a good line up with this activity as they scramble to meet their favourites. What I have seen myself and what I have heard has been nothing but praise for this show. Although it is new it is definitely going places and is a credit to Phoenix and Cassandra, and they must be so pleased to be supported by such a great cast. Well done all of you and good luck. Neil's lifelong friend and travel companion for many years, David Brown also spoke about their many adventures, as Neil was a highway man and loved doing the big miles in his beloved Holden cars, which were all in the latter years the top of the range V8 Holden Statesman's with plenty of muscle power.

It was no surprise to me to learn that Neil was a very successful businessman, a self-taught businessman and a no nonsense businessman. What I did

not know was Neil's love for the land as he was born on his parents' dairy farm and not only by the age of 20 did Neil own his own farm but had had two dairy farms that he owned that set him and his family up for life.

Anne and Neil were very proud grandparents as well, and the grandchildren each delivered a poem to reflect on their grandfather's life during the service as well. Two traditional Hymns were played also throughout the service *Praise, my soul, the King of Heaven* and *Now thank we all our God*.

Neil's love and passion for the circus was also mentioned in the eulogy, where Neil would always take his family to the show

On a sad note, the Hallmark of Royale for many years "Howell's Performing Holstein Friesian Cows" are no more. The surviving two cows of the regional four Heidi and Daisy have been retired to greener pastures on a farm in the outer suburbs of Perth. The Friesians were introduced by former proprietor Frank Gasser in 2001 when he saw a performance of cows in a European Circus and decided to make this an Australian first which prove to be very popular and one of my many favorites on Royale for years.

The clowning on this circus is still superb with father and son duo Fransisco and

emotional Circus Proprietor/Ringmaster Damian Syred bid farewell to Susana with a bouquet of flowers and told the audience he had seen her grow into a very fine lady indeed and that Susana also took out first prize at the 2016 Australian Circus Festival Awards and wished her well in her new endeavors, as Susana is bound for Las Vegas to train with Olga Pikhienkm for the upcoming world championships in Spain.

The Globe of Death still brings the program to a climax and with all eyes on our only female rider Geraldine Fernandez along

with brothers Hugo and Brandon from Mexico undertaking this daredevil feat. Ringmaster Damian

strikes up enough courage to enter the globe along with globe dancer Susana, as two riders go through their paces with a very nervous audience looking on and full credit to Damian and Susana as this is by no means an easy feat I would think. Also Hugo is now presenting Royale's two remaining camels and is taking it all in his stride.

Ringmaster Damian is still presenting Royale's touch of magic assisted by Chantal and Geraldine.
